Requesting A Vote-By-Mail Ballot

Contact Your County Supervisor of Elections (SOE)

To find the contact information of your county SOE please visit the following directory: https://dos.elections.myflorida.com/supervisors/. If you need assistance finding your county SOE contact, please call the Voter Protection Hotline at 1 (844) VOTE-FLA.

When making your request, please have your Driver License, Florida ID card, OR the last 4 digits of your Social Security number available.

1. Call

 When placing your call, please follow prompts that the SOE may have. When speaking with staff, tell them that you are calling to request a vote-by-mail ballot and they will quickly process your request.

2. Email

- You can email the SOE and simply state that you are requesting a vote-by-mail ballot and they will respond to help process your request
- o To expedite the process, here is a sample email
 - Hello, I would like to request a vote-by-mail ballot. My residential address is [insert address]. My mailing address is [insert address]. To verify my identity, my birthday date is [insert] and my Driver License number is [insert]. Many thanks, [insert full legal name]

Frequently Asked Questions

- If I request a vote-by-mail ballot, can I still vote in-person?
 - Yes! As long as you have not submitted your vote-by-mail ballot to the SOE, you
 can vote in-person. We highly recommend that you request a vote-by-mail ballot

even if you plan to vote in-person. It is a great back-up to have in case your schedule gets busy or you experience poll closures / polling location changes.

• Is there a deadline to request a vote-by-mail ballot?

 No! Unless you want it in the mail. You can request your vote-by-mail ballot up until Election Day. However, if you want the ballot mailed to you, the deadline to request a vote-by-mail ballot is no later than 5 p.m. on the 10th day before the election. We encourage you to place your request sooner, so you do not experience wait times or delays.

• Can I request a vote-by-mail ballot for someone else?

Yes, if they are immediate family members or legal guardians! Florida has defined immediate family as the voter's spouse or the parent, child, grandparent, grandchild, sibling of the voter, or sibling of the voter's spouse. At the voter's request, if you are an immediate family member or legal guardian, you may contact the SOE on their behalf.
